## Z nation cast season 3

Below Deck is a reality show on Bravo that follows crew members who live and work aboard the 164-foot mega-yacht called Honor. Upstairs and downstairs worlds collide as the young and primarily single crew, known as yachties, live, love and work behind the scenes of a luxurious, privately owned yacht, while also tending to every whim of their wealthy and demanding guests. The guest list changes with each episode as new charter customers board while others land, but the crew stays the same. In this photo album, meet the eight Below Deck cast members from season one. Each joined the show with a different level of experience, but all shared a love of life on the water and the ability to travel to beautiful and exotic places. Bravo Adrienne Gang is from Cleveland. As a flight attendant, she oversaw the other stewards. A veteran of the yacht industry, Gang was the picture of professionalism during working hours. But she partied so hard as she worked and loved to relax and enjoy the beautiful destinations she visited. A professional chef, Gang also cooked for celebrities and entertainers during the tour. Her sixth sense of knowing what customers want before asking made her a favorite on board. She said the lifestyle suited her because she loves to travel and gets restless when she's in the same place for too long. Bravo Aleks Taldykin is a Los Angeles native and was captain of Honor. He has been in love with the water since a young age and started working on fishing boats when he was just 12 years old. By the time he was 19, he had earned his first captain's licence. Within a year of starting his own company, Elite Yacht Management. His clients have included many celebrities and even heads of state. Taldykin called himself a Captain to the Stars, and he was proud to provide the best possible service. His personable manner and quick wit made him a favorite among charter-goers. Bravo Ben Robinson is chef from Oxford, England. He's a great cook on both land and sea. After working under Italian master chefs in Florence, he earned an apprenticeship at the Michelin-starred Restaurant The Fat Duck, based in The United Kingdom. Since then, Robinson has served as head chef on many yachts over the years, including the largest sailboat in the world. Once in port, he lives in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, where he enjoys his bachelor lifestyle but dreams of one day owning his own Michelin-rated restaurant. Bravo C.J. Lebeau is from San Diego. He first discovered his passion for sailing after college when he and a group of friends sailed to exotic locations like the Caribbean, Colombia and the San Blas Islands. Lebeau was a business manager from the University of San Diego and served as a marine engineer aboard Honor and liked to explore the nightlife while in port. When he got into trouble, he was often able to get himself out with his witty flirtation and sympathetic personality. Bravo David Bradberry from Alexandria, La. He immediately joined the Marines after graduating from high school, which allowed him to see the world. While in the Marines, Bradberry was stationed in places like Japan, Liberia and Italy. Aside from his day-to-day duties protecting classified information, equipment and U.S. dignitaries, he also had the opportunity to serve on security information for Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Condoleezza Rice. The former Marine is also a strong supporter of many nonprofit organizations, including The Trevor Project and Toys for Tots. Openly gay, Bradberry is in a long-term relationship with Trevor Knight. When they're not at sea, the couple live in California. Bravo Eddie Lucas is originally from Baltimore. He grew up on the East Coast, where he attended boarding schools and explored recreational diversions at Chesapeake and Buzzards Bays. He earned a degree in Adventure Education from Green Mountain College, becoming proficient in rafting, climbing, and diving. After surviving a car accident, Lucas embraced life even more and appreciates everything he has. Lucas was a coverman on the show. Bravo Kat Held hails from Warwick, R.I. She became interested in sailing after a summer of recreational sailing. After years of working as an assistant in a psychiatrist's office, she became restless and wanted to discover more of what the outside world had to offer. One day, after watching the yachts come in and out of Newport, R.I., Held took a book on how to become a steward and turned it into his first job as a yacht flight attendant in Miami. A self-described jokester, Held likes to be the life of the party and always has a list of social events to attend. Bravo Samantha Orme hails from Palm Harbor, Fla. She got her start working as a steward for her parents, who chartered a yacht her father had built, by hand, over the course of 20 years. Orme has an industrial engineering degree from Florida State University, which she says distinguishes her from the typical untrained yachty drifters. During her final year at FSU, she worked with NASA redesigning part of Ares I Rocket. A strong-willed leader, Worms likes to get things done properly and efficiently. Along with the other stewards (also known as stews), worms were responsible for maintaining all aspects of the ship, from cleaning and laundry to ensuring guests' needs were met. The final season of The Big Bang Theory is about to be. After nearly 12 years on television, the cast are finally saying goodbye. The show's ending announcement may have come last August, but it still hasn't made the end any easier to put up with. It's like a long, drawn-out death, Mayim Bialik, who plays Amy Farrah Fowler on the show, told Variety. It's one thing to have a personal experience where a job of nine years - or 12, for some of the votes - ends, but we've done it very publicly. And no one is ready for to come to an end. As Kaley [Cuoco has] said, we could do this 25 seasons and it would still be hard to say goodbye, Johnny Galecki, who plays Leonard, told the outlet. There won't be a time when any of us are tired of it. It feels as right as it's ever going to feel. But as the show comes to a close and the actors have to consider what their next job will be, let's take a look at how much the cast is doing for this past season. Mayim Bialik and Melissa Rauch pay. Bialik and Rauch are supporting characters on the show. The women are reportedly each doing the \$425,000 episode. Previously, women were only making \$175,000 per episode. That pay rise came after the five stars of the show agreed to take a \$100,000 per episode pay cut in 2017. Jim Parsons, Kaley Cuoco, Johnny Galecki, Kunal Nayyar and Simon Helberg's pre-Bialik and Rauch's 2017 pay rises each made \$1 million per episode. With the small pay cut, they are each making \$900,000 per episode. Actors wealth Throughout their time on the show, the cast of The Big Bang Theory have become some of the richest people on television. Between June 2017 and June 2018, Galecki earned \$25 million. His costars, Helberg and Nayyar, earned \$23.5 million. For four years in a row, Parsons earned \$26.5 million. During that period, Cuoco became the second highest paid actor on television by earning \$24.5 million. How are the actors feel about the show's ending? While the cast is sad that the show is about to be, they seem to be happy with the way things are wrapping up. I'm excited about [Penny's] ending, but starting, Cuoco told Entertainment Tonight. It's beautiful. There's nothing catastrophic, it's just beautiful. And the characters will live on in your minds and hearts, and I think that's what's so special about it. It's really touching. The goal of the final episodes of the show was to give each character one last time in the spotlight. When we found out this would be the last season we sat together and started talking about the landing place, executive producer Steve Holland told Variety. We knew what was going to be the last piece of the finals for a long time. One of the things that was important to us, and also the most challenging, was to make sure that everyone came to shine in these final episodes. We'll also be served a ton of season 3 teases full of 80s teen things like listening to boomboxes, hanging out in the mall, and trying on loud, colorful patterns.
